

STARVED ROCK HISTORICAL AND EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

Starved Rock State Park

280 acres of land including the site of famous Starved Rock (sandstone butte above the Illinois River) was purchased by the State of Illinois in 1911 after local citizens urged the state to protect the beautiful 18 canyons and 7 overlooks found in the area. Since then over 3,000 acres have been added to the park including neighboring Matthiessen State Park, Marjory C Carlson Nature Preserve, Sandy Ford Natural Area, and Mitchell's Grove Nature Preserve.

Starved Rock State Park is truly a one of kind location in the heart of the Midwest. The land is rich in history and geology that is unique to this area of Illinois. St. Peter Sandstone found in this area of Illinois creates the beautiful backdrop of each canyon and overlook at the park.

On the North side of Starved Rock flows the Illinois River where visitors can view white pelicans in the spring and summer amongst species of gulls, waterfowl, and terns and bald eagles in the winter.

The mix of oak and maple forest is sprinkled with eastern pine, northern white cedar, and eastern red cedar-3 species leftover in the canyons from the cold climate created from the last glacial period 15,000 years ago.

Humans have utilized this areas resources as far back as 10,000 years from the Archaic-Woodland-Mississippian Culture to present day.

Those that "flock to the rock" come for nature walks, eagle viewing, bird watching, adventure, camping, fishing, hunting, and more.
